Sir. We would respectfully  
state to you, that, Lindsey Sanders, James  
Parish, John Pettigrew, John Smith, Mr. McCollum,  
Benjamin Hosen, H. M. Green, C. C. Gitchrist,  
and John Anderson are citizens of M'Kains  
County Pennsylvania and had never been in the Rebel Army  
or any other force. They were arrested on or near the  
battle field at Pittsburgh Penn. on Thursday after  
the Battle, and sent as prisoners to St Louis  
Mo. on the next day; from our personal  
knowledge of several of the parties and from  
information received from Loyal men as to the others,  
we are satisfied that they are all Loyal  
men and men only intending to visit the  
battle field through curiosity and never  
arrested by your Pickets on approaching the  
field - they have been Loyal to the U. S. State  
all the time, and some of them have fled  
their homes, to avoid arrest by Rebel troops.  
We respectfully ask you to order their release  
and permit them to return to their homes.

We can refer you to Major General Grant's  
staff as our Loyalty and Personality
