# APOCRYPHA.

## I. ESDRAS.

### CHAP. I.

1 *Josias his charge to the priests and Levites. 7 A great passover is kept. 32 His death is much lamented. 34 His successors. 53 The temple, city, and many people are destroyed. 56 The rest are carried unto Babylon.*

**A**ND Josias held the <sup>a</sup>feast of the passover in Jerusalem unto his Lord, and offered the passover <sup>b</sup>the fourteenth day of the first month;

2 Having set the priests according to their daily courses, being arrayed in long garments, in the temple of the Lord.

3 And he spake unto the Levites, the holy ministers of Israel, that they should hallow themselves unto the Lord, to set the holy ark of the Lord in the house that king Solomon the son of David had built:

4 And said, Ye shall no more bear the ark upon your shoulders: now therefore serve the Lord your God, and minister unto his people Israel, and prepare you <sup>c</sup>after your families and kindreds,

5 According as David the king of Israel prescribed, and according to the magnificence of Solomon his son: and standing in the temple according to the several dignity of the families of you the Levites, who minister in the presence of your brethren the children of Israel,

6 Offer the passover in order, and make ready the sacrifices for your brethren, and keep the passover according to the commandment of the Lord which was given unto Moses.

7 <sup>d</sup>And unto the people that was found there, Josias gave thirty thousand lambs and kids, and three thousand calves: these things were given of the king's allowance, according as he promised to the people, to the priests, and to the Levites.

8 And Helkias, Zacharias, and <sup>e</sup>Sylus, the governors of the temple, gave to the priests for the passover, two thousand and six hundred sheep, and three hundred calves.

9 And Jeconias, and Samaias, and Nathanael his brother, and Assabias, and Ochiel, and Joram, captains over thousands, gave to the Levites for the passover five thousand sheep, and <sup>f</sup>seven hundred calves.

10 And when these things were done, the priests and Levites having the unleavened bread, stood in very comely order according to the kindreds,

11 And according to the several dignities of the fathers, before the people, to offer to the Lord, as it is written in the book of Moses: <sup>g</sup>and thus did they in the morning.

12 And they roasted the passover with fire as appertaineth: as for the sacrifices, they sod them in brass pots, and pans, <sup>h</sup>with a good savour,

13 And set them before all the people: and afterwards they prepared for themselves, and for the priests their brethren, the sons of Aaron.

14 For the priests offered the fat until night: and the Levites prepared for themselves, and the priests their brethren, the sons of Aaron.

15 The holy singers also, the sons of Asaph, were in their order, according to the appointment <sup>i</sup>of David, to wit, Asaph, Zacharias, and Jeduthun, who was <sup>j</sup>of the king's retinue.

16 Moreover, the porters were at every gate; it was not lawful for any to go from his ordinary service: for their brethren the Levites prepared for them.

17 <sup>k</sup>Thus were the things that belonged to the sacrifices of the Lord accomplished in that day, that they might hold the passover,

18 And offer sacrifices upon the altar of the Lord, according to the commandment of king Josias.

19 So the children of Israel which were present <sup>l</sup>held the passover at that time, and the feast of sweet bread seven days.

20 <sup>m</sup>And such a passover was not kept in Israel since the time of the prophet Samuel.

21 Yea, all the kings of Israel held not such a passover as Josias, and the priests, and the Levites, and the Jews, held with all Israel that were found dwelling at Jerusalem.

22 <sup>n</sup>In the eighteenth year of the reign of Josias was this passover kept.

23 And the works of Josias were upright before his Lord, with an heart full of godliness.

24 As for the things that came to pass in his time, they were written in former times, concerning those that sinned, and <sup>o</sup>did wickedly against the Lord above all people and kingdoms, and how they grieved him <sup>p</sup>exceedingly, so that the words of the Lord rose up against Israel.

25 <sup>q</sup>Now after all these acts of Josias, it came to pass, that Pharaoh the king of Egypt came to raise war at Carchamis upon Euphrates: and Josias went out against him.

26 <sup>r</sup>But the king of Egypt sent to him, saying, What have I to do with thee, O king of Judea?

27 I am not sent out from the Lord God against thee; for my war is upon Euphrates: and now the Lord is with me, yea, the Lord is with me, hasting me forward: depart from me, and be not against the Lord.

28 <sup>s</sup>Howbeit Josias did not turn back his chariot from him, but undertook to fight with him,

It is with the deepest regret we announce the death of ex-Governor CANNON. The tried friend of our youth and manhood, the sterling patriot whom we have delighted to honor, and the honest man whom we have ever venerated with almost filial regard, is no more! We knew him well, and can truly say that an honest man, or a purer patriot never breathed the vital air. The melancholy intelligence of his demise is thus communicated in the Nashville Wing of Friday last:

The mysterious disease, which in the dispensation of Divine Providence, suddenly attacked this excellent citizen, and distinguished and honored public servant, a few days since, terminated his existence at 7 o'clock, last evening. And although the paralytic shock, and the course of active treatment to which the Governor was subjected, had made rapid and distressing inroads upon his athletic frame, (so recently in the vigor of health,) he yielded his spirit to the God who gave it, with the utmost resignation, and in all apparent composure.

ordinary place in the political annals of Tennessee. For more than thirty years a citizen of the State, honest and highly responsible stations in the local and national councils, in all which he was distinguished for a sincerity of purpose, and a zealous devotion to the common weal, that won the respect of his colleagues, and commended him to the confidence of his constituents. A member of the State Legislature in 1811 and in several subsequent sessions—a member of Congress in 1816 and again in 1819-20, representing a district embracing at that time about half the territory of Middle Tennessee—a member of the State Convention in 1834—and Governor of Tennessee from 1835 to 1839, he was with honor and success through the gradations of political life, to the highest office known to the Constitution of his adopted State.

In the relations of private life, few men were more truly beloved than Gov. CANSON. Sincere in his attachments, exact in his dealings, unostentatious in his character, and kind and indulgent in the domestic circle, he lived respected and died lamented, the upright neighbor and devoted friend.

Mrs. RAPHAEL S. CANNON, the venerable widow of ex-Gov. Newton Cannon, of this State, died on Sunday last, at the residence in this city of her son-in-law, W. G. T. Claiborne. She was a cultivated lady, held in high esteem by a large circle of acquaintances, and endeared to a numerous relationship. Her death severs another link of the present with the happier days of the past.

Died, Jan. 6, 1867. Mrs. RACHEL STARRS CANNON, relict of the late Governor Newton Cannon, at the residence of her son-in-law, Maj. Charlotte, of Nashville. Mrs. Cannon had just entered upon her 72d year, and had been a member of the Methodist Church about 65 years. She was, in almost any point of light in which she can be viewed, a superior lady. She was blessed with a fine natural mind and good person—had more than ordinary early advantages—was well connected in her social relations. As a member of the Church, she was well instructed. She knew the ministers, she understood the doctrines and usages of the Church, she read its literature, she conformed to its rules, she asked no privileges which the Church did not grant, and objected to the preached word, no more than ordinary early advantages. She attended to the prayer and class-meeting, she was always at the Church, her God, and her family, and responded to all the demands of society and humanity. As a wife, mother, neighbor, and friend, she was equal to the position. Her life was a success, and her last moments were that of the righteous.
