Strange Bible Facts.

The learned Prince of Granada, heir to the Spanish throne, imprisoned by order of the Crown for fear he should aspire to the throne, was kept in solitary confinement in the old prison at the Place of Skulls, Madrid. After thirty-three years in this living tomb death came to his release, and the following remarkable researches, taken from the Bible and marked with an old nail on the rough walls of his cell, told how the brain sought employment through the weary years:

In the Bible the word "Lord" is found 1,853 times.

The word "Jehovah" 6,855 times.

The word "reverend" but once, and that in the ninth verse of Psalms xli.

The eighth verse of the ninety-seventh Psalm is the middle verse of the Bible.

The ninth verse of the eighth chapter of Esther is the longest.

The thirty-fifth verse of the seventh chapter of St. John is the shortest.

In the one hundred and seventh Psalm four verses are alike—the eighth, fifteenth, twenty-first, thirty-first.

Each verse of the one hundred and thirty-sixth Psalm ends alike.

No names or words with more than six letters are found in the Bible.

The thirty-seventh chapter of Isaiah and nineteenth chapter of Second Kings are alike.

The word "girl" occurs but once in the Bible, and that in the third verse of the third chapter of Joel.

There are found in both books of the Bible 3,528,483 letters, 773,692 words, 31,373 verses, 1,189 chapters and 66 books.

The twenty-sixth chapter of the Acts of the Apostles is the finest chapter to read.

The most beautiful chapter is the twenty-third Psalm.

The four most inspiring promises are John xiv, 2; vi, 37; Matthew vi, 28; Psalms xxxvii, 4.

The first verse of the fiftieth chapter of Isaiah is the one for the new convert.

All who flatter themselves with vain boasting should read the sixth chapter of Matthew.

All humanity should learn the sixth chapter of St. Luke from the twentieth verse to its ending.—Herald and Presbyterian.

APPROACHING A CENTURY.

Capt. A. G. Dunn Dead at the Age of 91 Years at Hendersonville.

News reached THE AMERICAN last night of the death at Hendersonville, Tenn., of Capt. A. G. Dunn yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock. Capt. Dunn was born and raised within six miles of Nashville, at the old Shute place, on the Nolensville turnpike. About seventy-five years ago he moved to Sumner County, where he has since resided, and he died at his home near Hendersonville. He had been a Mason for fifty years or more, and always enjoyed splendid health until he began to break down of old age, and then he gradually declined until the human machinery wore out. Capt. Dunn left four sons and a daughter surviving him. The daughter is Mrs. T. B. Dixon, of Nashville; the sons are D. H. Dunn, M. C. Dunn, John G. Dunn and G. D. Dunn, all farmers in Sumner County. He leaves also nineteen grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. He was connected with a number of the best families in Davidson County, and left an immense circle of friends, including about all who had ever known him. The funeral services will be held this afternoon at Hendersonville at 3:30 o'clock, and a number of friends and relatives from Nashville will probably attend.
