COTTRELLVILLE, FAYETTE CO., March, 1831.
Died, on the 20th instant, at his mother's residence in
Prince William Co., Va., Mr. PAUL H. EWELL, of an
affliction of the liver, and in the 20th year of his age.
When a friend, with all the fond anticipations of youth,
and the acquirements of maturer years, is torn from
among us, by the universal leveler, 'tis then we feel the
bitterness of woe, and the tear of commiseration is called
forth from every sympathizing breast. Mr. Ewell had
just entered the arena of life, buoyant with prospects as
flattering as any one's; but alas, the man of his youth had
not arrived at the verge of manhood, ere he was snatched
away. The science of medicine, being the profession of
his choice, he pursued it with that energy, diligence, and
devotion, which ensure success, but which were, unhappily,
too well calculated to impair his constitution. Generous,
kind, and affectionate in his disposition, he ensured
a reciprocity of friendship with friends, and conciliated
the esteem of all to whom he became known. Yet, all these
good qualities could not save him from the icy arms of death -
the imperative mandate went forth, and Ewell died. But
while we drop a tear of sorrow over his untimely grave,
let us not measure that Power by which instrumentally
he was taken; but bow with humble acquiescence and
submission to the decrees of that all-wise and gracious
Providence, whose ways are incomprehensible. Uncommonly
correct in his moral deportment, and scrupulously religious
in his habits, Mr. Ewell met his approaching dissolution
with that resignation which is the peculiar characteristic
of the Christian.
His intellectual brilliancy, stability of character, the
sympathy of friends, or the tears of a fond parent and
affectionate sister, could save us from death's cold
embrace; but Ewell would not have died, nor had this
last and noblest tribute to departed merit been written by
A FRIEND.

Virginia Ewell of Thomas & Elizabeth

17 years 8 months 14 days - buried

Thomas Ewell of Thomas & Elizabeth
did in the Regiment of James
H. Pleasants died on the morning of
the 19th April 1837 - of a wound
received at the battle of Cerro
Gordo - Mexico - the 19th
of June month - while nobly
leading his men to victory -

Died on the 12th of the month instant, in
Cottrellville, Virginia, Mrs. Elizabeth Ewell, the wife
of Major Benjamin Ewell, late Secretary of the
Army of the United States of America. Her
remains were deposited on Saturday
11 o'clock, A. M. in Addison's Chapel, in Prince
George's county, attended by an unusual number
of carriages and horsemen; at the grave yard there
they were decently and solemnly deposited to sleep
in a bed, till the issue of the last trumpet shall
awake them from their slumbers, into eternity and
life. Her death was the result of the influenza
which she had contracted in a
new and violent degree.

In her death, her husband has retained
the lot of an orphan, and her children are
destitute of parental care and protection. Her
dear and charitable son, who has been her
noble and faithful companion, and
constant one of her brightest ornaments.
The approaches of the day of terrors were
gradual. She saw him at a distance and prepared
for the stroke.
To an acquaintance who paid her a visit a
few days before her exit, she said, "My friend, let me
have a short paper; this friendly gift, and your
kind words, will be a great comfort to me."
The deceased repeated the following words, which
she repeated the following words, "I have long
believed some can say themselves, 'We need be
fear of the visit of death.' And with
common sense, I long to be with
him." Let the earnest ministers upon this

Deaths.

Ewell of Williamsburg Virginia was killed on the morning of Tuesday 7th 18th of January aged 74 years & 4 months and a sleep of 10 days & he was buried in the Public grounds belonging to the College. And behold I come quickly.
