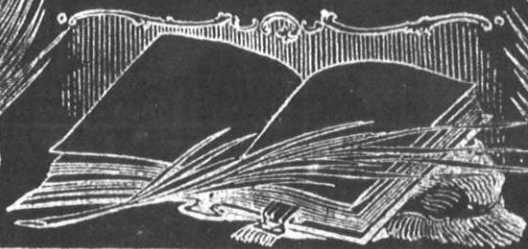

Following the death of Anne Jane and William B. Bell, William's son Walter A. Bell carried on the school ^{mathematics} ~~at~~ Cloverdale Seminary took beginners through calculus. They taught Latin, Greek, French and German, Music on piano, organ, guitar and mandolin also art.

Being a boarding school they had students from Virginia, Ky., Ark. Okla., Tex., Fla and other states.

Walter Bell, being the leader of one of Ireland's many rebellions, was forced to leave the country in 1812. Having visited the United States many times he decided to come to America. He brought his household goods, race horse and all the family but left one girl Anne Jane in college in England. They settled in Virginia ^{near Philadelphia} but came to Cloverdale Dickson County in 1822.

As soon as Anne Jane had finished college she came to America.

A son William B. Bell was born to this family in 1818.

Anne Jane and William B. Bell founded Cloverdale Seminary in 1843.
