NORMAN—At his residence in this
city, on the 6th inst., Hon. JOHN
NORMAN, aged about 70 years.

Thus has passed away one of Car-
roll county's best citizens. The life
of Judge Norman is closely connect-
ed with the history of Carroll county.
Since the early settlements of the
county he has held an honorable and
prominent position before our people,
often in an official capacity. He was
first elected constable, over thirty
years ago, in which capacity he proved
an efficient officer. He was after-
wards elected sheriff at three success-
ive elections, holding the office for
six years, at which time he became
ineligible under the constitution to
hold longer. He was then three
times elected clerk of the circuit
court, holding the position for twelve
years. He was once elected to the
legislature, prior to the war, and also
served in the lower house of the first
legislature after the war, and was a
legislator from Carroll, Gibson and
Dyer in the second legislature after
the war, and was put in nomination
for the position of speaker of the
senate, and came within one vote of
being elected, and would have been,
except for the absence of Senator Mc
Call of West Tennessee, and in case
that he should have been elected he
would have succeeded Governor
Brownlow as governor of Tennessee.
The Hon. D. W. C. Senter was his
successful opponent, and by virtue of
his election reached the position of
governor. Judge Norman died as he
had lived, a true christian. In both
private and official position he has
ever stood high as a man of integrity,
and perhaps no one in our midst has
done more for his fellow men. He
leaves behind an untarnished name
that will long be perpetuated in the
memory of his many friends.

ERNEST NORMAN IS BURIED TODAY

Retired Huntingdon Merchant Passes
Away at His Home Wednesday
Morning; Fine Citizen

Ernest M. Norman, for many years
a leading citizen of Huntingdon and
Carroll County, died at his home on
East Paris St., Wednesday morning
about 5:30 o'clock, death resulting
from an illness of several weeks.

Mr. Norman was born and reared
in Carroll county, the son of the late
John Bell Norman of the Nineteenth
district. During his early life he was
associated with his father in the
farming business and later became
a railroad man, but lost his arm in an
accident, forcing him to retire from
railroad work. For a number of years
he was in the grocery and market
business and during the last few
years before his retirement he and
Claude Reeder were partners in the
Norman & Reeder grocery.

He had been associated with the
Carroll County Fair for many years.
He was actively engaged in the af-
fairs of the Carroll County Farm Bu-
reau and served as secretary last
year. He was also a member of the
county committee of the Agricultural
Conservation Association.

Funeral services for Mr. Norman
were conducted this (Friday) morn-
ing at the Huntingdon Methodist
by the Rev. R. A. Wood, pastor. In-
terment was at Clark Cemetery.

Mr. Norman is survived by one
daughter, Mrs. C. H. Moody of Co-
lumbia, S. C., who with her husband
was with him through his last illness.

The untimely passing of E. M. Nor-
man came as a great shock to his
many friends in Huntingdon and Car-
roll county and his absence will be
noted at meetings dedicated for the
best interests of the farming in-
terests.

21 And the remnant were slain with the sword of him that sat upon the horse, which sword proceeded out of his mouth: and all the fowls were filled with their flesh.

CHAP. XX.

AND I saw an angel come down from heaven, having the key of the bottomless pit and a great chain in his hand.

2 And he laid hold on the dragon, that old serpent, which is the Devil, and Satan, and bound him a thousand years.

3 And cast him into the bottomless pit, and shut him up, and set a seal upon him, that he should deceive the nations no more, till the thousand years should be fulfilled; and after that he must be loosed a little season.

4 And I saw thrones, and they sat upon them, and judgment was given unto them: and I saw the souls of them that were beheaded for the witness of Jesus, and for the word of God, and which had not worshipped the beast, neither his image, neither had received his mark upon their foreheads, or in their hands; and they lived and reigned with Christ a thousand years.

5 But the rest of the dead lived not again until the thousand years were finished. This is the first resurrection.

6 Blessed and holy is he that hath part in the first resurrection: on such the second death hath no power, but they shall be priests of God and of Christ, and shall reign with him a thousand years.

7 And when the thousand years are expired, Satan shall be loosed out of his prison,

8 And shall go out to deceive the nations which are in the four quarters of the earth, Gog and Magog, to gather them together to battle: the number of whom is as the sand of the sea.

9 And they went up on the breadth of the earth, and compassed the camp of the saints about, and the beloved city: and fire came down from God out of heaven, and devoured them.

10 And the devil that deceived them was cast into the lake of fire and brimstone, where the beast and the false prophet are, and shall be tormented day and night for ever and ever.

11 And I saw a great white throne, and him that sat on it, from whose face the earth and the heaven fled away; and there was found no place for them.

12 And I saw the dead, small and great, stand before God; and the books were opened: and another book was opened, which is the book of life: and the dead were judged out of those things which were written in the books, according to their works.

13 And the sea gave up the dead which were in it; and death and hell delivered up the dead which were in them: and they were judged every man according to their works.

And death and hell were cast into

the lake of fire. 15 And was ten in the book of fire.

AND I saw earth: for the first earth were no more sea.

2 And I John saw Jerusalem, coming down from heaven, prepared as her husband.

3 And I heard a voice, saying, Behold, the Lord is with men, and he will be his people, and they shall be his people, and he himself shall be with them, and will be with them, and will be with them.

4 And God shall wipe away from their eyes, and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away.

5 And he that sat upon the throne, Behold, I make all things new. He said unto me, Write: for these words are true and faithful.

6 And he said unto me, It is done. I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end. I will give unto him that is athirst of the fountain of the water of life freely.

7 He that overcometh shall inherit all things; and I will be his God, and he shall be my son.

8 But the fearful, and unbelieving, and the abominable, and murderers, and whoremongers, and sorcerers, and idolaters, and all liars, shall have their part in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone: which is the second death.

9 And there came unto me one of the seven angels, which had the seven vials full of the seven last plagues, and talked with me, saying, Come hither, I will shew thee the bride, the Lamb's wife.

10 And he carried me away in the spirit to a great and high mountain, and shewed me that great city, the holy Jerusalem, descending out of heaven from God.

11 Having the glory of God: and her light was like unto a stone most precious, even like a jasper-stone, clear as crystal:

12 And had a wall great and high, and had twelve gates, and at the gates twelve angels, and names written thereon, which are the names of the twelve tribes of the children of Israel.

13 On the east, three gates; on the north, three gates; on the south, three gates; and on the west, three gates.

14 And the wall of the city had twelve foundations, and in them the names of the twelve apostles of the Lamb.
