Head-Quarters 16th Army Corps,

MEMPHIS, TENN., November 1863.

Major General S. A. Heurlin
Commanding 16th Army Corps
Memphis Tennessee
General,

I have the honor pursuant to instructions from you to report as follows at 4. O'clock this P.M. I went to the Dry Goods house of A. Seifel and there took possession of his store and stocks of goods after the money, Books and papers of house.

The Money consisting of U. S. Treasury Notes, Bills of Exchange on Philadelphia for Postage currency and coin amounting to \$22,320.25 which by your verbal instruction I deposited with Maj. D. J. Burner A. D. C.

The Books papers and documents was carefully preserved and locked in the safe of the store, the keys now being in the possession of Maj. D. J. Burner senior A. D. C. I also found money (U. S. Treasury notes, Southern currency, Confederate money,

and Coin to the amount of \$~~274.00~~ deposited
by said A. Seesel as belonging to other parties
having been left for safe keeping with him this
money is also deposited with May, D. J. Benner
A. S. C.

The personal property of Abraham
Seesel consisted of 1 gold watch and chain, 1
pr. Scissors, 3 Memorandum Books, \$6.10 U. S. Treasury
notes and Postage currency - which is also deposited
with May, D. J. Benner A. S. C.

The personal effects found on book-
keeper Morris Kochstateter consisted of 1 watch \$10.
La currency, \$3.70 Treasury notes, 1 key, all of
which is deposited with May D. J. Benner A. S. C.

After a careful inspection and search
of all those employed, they the employees as clerk
was released and permitted to leave the store
taking with them nothing pertaining to the busi-
ness of the house,

Mr. A. Seesel and his Book-
keeper Morris Kochstateter were safely confined
in the living Room and I have now in my

possessing a receipt for the same from Capt.
John L Wilson Comdg. Prison
